You are in a unique position


- Aviation is one of the primary modes of transportation used by traffickers.
- Cabin crew are front-line personnel (face-to-face).
- Are in a unique position to be able to recognize visible signs of trafficking.
- Have enough time with passengers to be able to observe questionable situations.



Remember, Do No Harm

- Safety is your first concern.
- If you decide to take action, such as reporting it to authorities, do so in a way that will not endanger yourself or others.
- Do not confront suspected traffickers or transporters.
- Do not try to rescue possible victim.
- Do not display concern or alarm.
